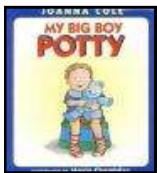

P.J. & PUPPY

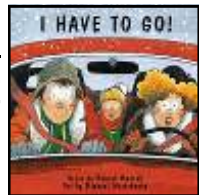
